Introduction

The year 2013 was not only a year of changes for ADRA Czech Republic, but also a year of several humanitarian crises in the Czech Republic and abroad. We witnessed numerous tense situations and disasters, but we also saw how much solidarity there is among us and that we will spare no effort to help others in need. This is reflected in the number of volunteers, who demonstrate great willingness to help selflessly, as well as in the balances on bank accounts where donors send their contributions. It is mainly thanks to these people that ADRA was able to help hundreds of families during floods in the Czech Republic. We also sent our special teams to the flooded areas to provide psychological and social help to the affected. We received many thanks from fellow citizens for being with them in such critical moments. The strong position of ADRA C in the field of humanitarian aid is also attested by the fact that we cooperate with the integrated rescue services.

The raging of Typhoon Hayian in the Philippines in December was yet another crisis for which we had to muster all our strength. The day after the cyclone hit the archipelago, we launched a public collection. When planning the humanitarian aid, we had a great advantage compared to other organisations: we are a part of the ADRA international network. ADRA CR could avoid lengthy and complicated mapping of the terrain before launching the relief; we could rely on knowledge of our colleagues who have been active in the Philippines in the long run and we could act immediately.

It is not just in unexpected crises that we try to help. We are systematically building a nationwide net of volunteer centres, where volunteers provide everyday sup-

port to lonely people. The number of these increased in 2013 as well as the number of institutions that are interested in cooperating with us. I am happy that volunteering is becoming natural in our country because it is a sign of mental maturity of a developed society. It is my wish that volunteering continues to grow in the Czech Republic and that we continue to be part of it. I have tried to contribute to this idea as the head of the Volunteer Centre in Frýdek-Místek and, and since September, as the director of ADRA CR. At that time, ADRA CR changed its legal status from an unincorporated association to a benevolent association. This allows us to look for new ways of development. It is a challenge for me to take the reins of such a respected organisation that ADRA has become in the Czech Republic, also thanks to my predecessor, Jan Bárta.

I would like to thank all donors and all the people who helped both at home and abroad last year. The year 2013 confirmed yet again that ADRA has many supporters. We are very grateful and we hope that we will not disappoint you in 2014 either.

Our successes in 2013

We supported the education of children in Bangladesh. 866 Czech donors supported the education of 1,300 children.

We recognised bravery of others with the Michal Velíšek Award. This has been the 8th year of acknowledging heroes of our time.

We secured access to water for people in Ethiopia.

463 families and their domestic animals gained immediate access to drinking water.

We helped during floods. To alleviate the aftermath of floods that hit the Czech Republic in the summer, we distributed more than 18 million crowns.

We helped when the Philippines were hit by a typhoon. We gave away more than 5,000 food packages and 2,000 personal hygiene kits after the raging of Typhoon Hayian.

We improved access to health care in Kenya.

The outpatient department of the health care centre in Itibo treated 9,000 patients.

We equipped clinics in Myanmar. We distributed medical equipment to 12 local clinics in the Kayin State.

We stood by lonely people. 1,721 volunteers made 23,770 visits with sick, suffering and underprivileged people.

We implemented educational programmes about global problems for 739 children in kindergartens, 1,477 pupils in elementary schools, and 635 students in secondary schools. 100 education students attended semester courses of global development education PRVák.

We supported farmers in Mongolia. The farms in the province of Selenge that we supported increased their yield by 35 tons of vegetables in comparison with the previous year.

Our work in the Czech Republic

Humanitarian aid during floods in the Czech Republic

At the beginning of June 2013, the Czech Republic was affected by devastating floods. Coping with their consequences was one of the largest projects of ADRA CR that year. ADRA immediately activated its flood team and sent coordinators to affected areas. ADRA immediately released 250,000 Czech crowns (CZK) from the emergency fund to provide support to people affected by the floods. ADRA also opened an account for a public collection, where donors sent almost 18 million crowns. In cooperation with municipalities, ADRA CR purified wells and provided expert advice during remediation. Trained teams joined in the removal of consequences of floods and provided psychological and social help to people in need.

ADRA CR supported financially approximately 400 families in South Bohemia, in the regions of Litoměřice, Sedlčany, Kolín, Nymburk and in the surroundings of Prague. Resources were allocated to reconstruction, damp proofing and drinking water remediation.

ADRA support during the floods of 2013 in numbers:

- 250 000 CZK released from the emergency fund
- 2.5 million CZK worth of material aid distributed in nearly 40 villages
- 18 million CZK raised to help people affected by the flood
- 250 volunteers dispatched
- 350 dryers lent out
- 400 families recieved financial aid




Volunteer centres (VC)

Volunteers work mainly with lonely people. They help senior citizens, people with disabilities, the sick, and underprivileged children. They visit them in receiving institutions or at home and spend time with them. They go for walks with them, read to them, talk to them and listen. Volunteers are trained and have insurance. They receive support from volunteer centres during their service.

Ten ADRA volunteer centres operated in the Czech Republic in 2013. They acted as intermediaries between receiving institutions and volunteers. In 2013, volunteer centres cooperated with 118 welfare, healthcare and other institutions and coordinated activities of 1,721 regular volunteers, who donated to others 52,137 hours of their free time, which amounts to work worth a total of 5.5 million crowns. Each volunteer worked on average 30 hours in 2013, thus donating work worth on average 3,216 crowns a year. Most volunteers were not from the economically active population; two largest groups were students and the unemployed. These groups are not expected to have large income and yet, they contributed to society by donating 1.8 and 1.5 million crowns respectively by giving their free time. Moreover, volunteering is a way of gaining work experience for them.



Charity shops and clothes banks

Charity shops are one of the tools for procuring resources to support volunteering and other projects. We sell donated clothes and furnishings for low prices. The first shop was established in Frýdek-Místek in autumn 2010. Gradually, we opened shops in Havířov and Frýdlant-nad-Ostravicí. In 2013 we opened other shops in Frýdek-Místek and Karviná. ADRA CR ran a total of five shops in 2013. Items that cannot be sold are given to the homeless and to the underprivileged in an affiliated facility - a clothes bank, where we distribute clothes, furnishings and household equipment, and personal hygiene and sanitation products.

Clothes banks are currently operated in Frýdek-Místek, Havířov, Frýdlant-nad-Ostravicí and Karviná. ADRA CR operated a total of four clothes banks in 2013.



Global development education programme PRVák




The global development education programme is designed for young people to arouse their interest in the world and global issues in context. Students and teachers learn about global processes and their influence in everyday life. This allows them to react appropriately to developments in the society where they live. The programme introduces topics such as migration, environmental protection, poverty, responsible consumption, fair trade, and human rights. Students are encouraged to understand the interconnectedness of their own lives with the lives of others and to discuss the impact of our behaviour and lifestyle on lives of inhabitants in other parts of the world. In 2013 ADRA CR implemented programmes for children in kindergartens, elementary schools and secondary schools. In autumn 2013 ADRA organised semester courses of global development education at the Faculty of Education at universities in Liberec and Hradec Králové. In June 2013, an exhibition called "From place to place" introduced art by elementary school pupils on the topic of movement of people and things in a globalised world. Five schools were awarded a prestigious World School Certificate during the project.

PRVák in 2013:

- 4 semester courses were organised for 100 students of Faculties of Education.
- 83 kindergarten and elementary school teachers participated in seminars.
- 739 children from kindergartens took part in 34 programmes, 1,477 elementary school pupils participated in 66 programmes, and 635 secondary school students participated in 25 programmes.
- 5 schools earned the World School Certificate.
- 2,304 elementary school pupils were actively involved in the arts competition.
- D140 students from 8 schools participated in workshops for school collectives.

Community intervention psychosocial teams



KIP teams (community intervention psychosocial teams) are teams of specially trained volunteers who provide psychosocial support to victims of car accidents, fires, storms, tornados and other disasters. The teams cooperate with the police, fire brigades and ambulance services.

In 2013 KIP team members helped during floods in the Czech Republic or during a gas explosion in a block of flats in Frenštát pod Radhoštěm.

KIP teams in 2013:

- In 2013, 14 groups with a total of 150 volunteers were actively involved in KIP team activities all over the Czech Republic.
- During floods in Central Bohemia, KIP teams in Kladno and Kolín in cooperation with the psychologist from the Central Bohemia Fire Brigade reported 140 interventions.
- Other five KIP team members from Ostrava and Trinec were active in Křešice in the Ústí-nad-Labem Region. Several interventions were also recorded in South Bohemia with the support of members from České Budějovice.

While responding to emergencies in 2013, ADRA CR cooperated with People in Need and with Czech Red Cross on the development of a mobile application Coordinator, which will speed up an emergency response by facilitating communication between KIP team leaders and volunteers. ADRA CR also cooperated with General Headquarters of Fire Brigade on a Czech Television project called "Crisis Map of the Czech Republic". This map will provide general public with information about road conditions during floods in affectedareas. The public will also be able to upload current information.

Counselling centre and Children's Crisis Centre in Hradec Králové

The counselling and psychotherapeutic centre in Hradec Králové has been offering services to victims of domestic violence and crime for more than 11 years, offering help to such victims free of charge. Professionals provide legal advice, psychotherapeutic help and other services. The Children's Crisis Centre focuses on helping children in need who were victims of bullying, abuse and domestic violence.

The counsellors share their experience also abroad. They participated in a project in Georgia that aimed to improve the protection of rights of victims of domestic violence. They trained local police, doctors, social workers, lawyers and representatives of human rights non-profit organisations, sharing valuable experience. The centre is also accredited by University Hradec Králové as a place for practical training of students of the Department of Social Work at the Faculty of Education. In cooperation with the Police of CR, Municipal Police Hradec Králové, and the Intervention Centre, and with financial support of the Ministry of Interior of CR and the City of Hradec Králové, the centre carried out a project "Support of Safety of Senior Citizens", which aims to improve the prevention of domestic violence aimed at senior citizens. The centre issued a publication Guidelines for Safe Behavior for Senior Citizens, which is also available on the web of the counselling centre.

Counselling centre and Children's Crisis Centre in 2013:

- Counsellors worked with 70 victims of violence and 56 aggressors.
- 171 clients visited the Children's Crisis Centre and 71 clients participated in adjustment regimes.




Developing internal capacity of ADRA CR

Humanitarian projects

When people are affected by natural disasters or war conflicts, they urgently need drinking water, health care, sanitation, basic clothing and shelter so that they may have dignified living conditions as soon as possible. ADRA CR implements humanitarian aid through its own projects or in cooperation with other ADRA branches in foreign countries.

The Philippines

On Friday, November 8, the Philippines were hit by Typhoon Hayian, which was the strongest continental cyclone according to experts. Based on estimates, the cyclone claimed more than 5,000 lives and left more than 3.5 million people homeless. It was mainly the central islands that were hit; in these areas, more than 80 percent of buildings were destroyed. Hayian levelled many coastal cities and villages, which were swept by huge waves that demolished guays with ships. For several weeks, chaos ruled the islands because road infrastructure was destroyed, energy supply was cut off in large areas, mobile phones were not working, and communication was possible only via satellite phones. Thousands of people were completely dependent on humanitarian aid, needing especially water, food and shelter.

Humanitarian aid in the aftermath of Typhoon Hayian

Immediately after the catastrophe, ADRA CR launched a public collection and, together with the international network of ADRA organisations, started to monitor the affected areas. We focused on one of the most affected regions - the Visayas - specifically the Island of Panay. Immediately after the catastrophe, we provided drinking water, food and makeshift shelter. We also participated in a renewal of water sources and a distribution of disinfectants and hygiene products. After the emergency response, ADRA launched several developmental projects in the central Philippines. They focused on the renewal of fishing, which is a key source of livelihood for the local population. The fishermen could not carry out their work because their ships and nets were destroyed in the typhoon. ADRA financed the construction and reconstruction of ship. We also brought instructors who taught the locals to built boats from resistant laminate. The programme also helped women in their difficult situation by providing cash for work, which is a form of financial help. People were paid for work that was directly connected with relief activities. The women mended fishing nets.

- By the end of the year, thanks to the generosity of Czech donors, ADRA CR collected almost 7.5 million crowns at the public collection account, which were used for humanitarian aid.
- Almost 5,000 families received food worth 55,000 dollars from the international organisation ADRA

- ADRA distributed almost 2,000 personal hygiene kits (a water can, soap, a toothbrush, a towel, etc.) and brought into operation 7 water purifiers, which serve about 50,000 inha-
- Together with the medical staff in a hospital in Estancia,
- ADRA examined almost 1,500 women and children and provided them with nutritional supplements.



Myanmar

Myanmar was controlled by a military regime for several decades, which has had ramifications for the country to this date. The population in remote areas of the state of Kayin is suffering from terrible living conditions due to an armed conflict between Kayin forces and the Myanmarese army. Especially the isolated areas near the border with Thailand, which are not controlled by Myanmarese authorities, are very poor and underdeveloped. There are no community facilities and no health care. ADRA projects aim to provide medical services to the locals and improve local sanitation.

Support of clinics in remote areas of south-east Myanmar

In 2013, ADRA CR supported community centres established by Kayin medical groups and maintained by the inhabitants of surrounding villages. These community clinics provide health care under difficult conditions; they serve to the locals, in-state resettled refugees and returnees from refugee camps. The medical staff was trained by medical professionals from the Christian Leprosy Hospital in Mawlamyine. They completed training to treat less complicated cases. They also focused on hygiene and education in their communities. All community medical staff received a financial contribution for their activities. ADRA CR equipped the centres with antibiotics, anti-diarrhoea medicine, antimalarials, vitamins, antacids, analgesics, tropical ointments, bandages and covering materials, elementary surgical materials, laboratory kits and testing kits for malaria and type B hepatitis.

- ADRA CR in cooperation with ADRA Myanmar supported 12 health care centres in the regions of Hlaingwe and Myawaddy.
- These clinics serve 97 villages with 49,000 inhabitants.
- On average, 5,000 patients are treated every month.
- Each centre has approximately 5 to 6 workers who mostly work as volunteers.



Help to victims of floods

In August, the state of Kayin was hit by heavy floods, which drove 35,000 people to evacuation centres. ADRA CR cooperated with the international network of ADRA to provide immediate humanitarian aid and subsequently to renew local agriculture. Providing relief was extremely challenging due to a complicated access to some locations.

- 850 families received food packages.
- 163 families received bags with new seeds.
- 3 schools received desks and chairs..



Support of communities in Meikhtila

In May 2013, violence broke out between Buddhist and Muslim communities in the city of Meikhtila in central Myanmar. According to the government sources, 44 people were killed and 61 injured. Arson attacks affected homes of almost 13,000 people, who had to seek shelter in temporary camps. ADRA Myanmar coordinated help with local authorities, UN agencies and other non-governmental organisations. ADRA CR donated almost 60,000 crowns.

 Thanks to the financial support of ADRA, 1,415 families received drinking water tanks and personal hygiene products.



Ethiopia

Ethiopia is the third most populated country in Africa after Nigeria and Egypt. It is also one of the poorest countries in the world. Although the country has a great economic potential and the economy has been growing for several years, almost 30 percent of inhabitants still live in extreme poverty and more than half of the adult population is illiterate. Sources of livelihood are very limited. The situation has been worsened by droughts, which affected the entire region of the Horn of Africa including Ethiopia in recent years. More than 10 million people, out of which a half were children, needed help. ADRA CR provided humanitarian aid by securing drinking water to people in the region of Somali.

Reservoirs in areas hit by extreme droughts

In the region of Garilee and Dhabab, ADRA CR secured access to water for 462 families and their cattle. ADRA also followed up a previous project that was implemented with a partner organisation ADRA Ethiopia in the region of Somali.

In cooperation with local communities and authorities, ADRA built protected water reservoirs, which provided enough water for entire villages. Women did not have to travel for water several kilometres a day. ADRA also organised training for the locals to educate them about principles of personal hygiene and about taking proper care of water.

- Two water reservoirs were constructed in 2013.
- 462 families and their cattle gained access to water.



Jordan and Syria

Jordan is a country neighbouring with Syria which has been buffeted by a civil war. By the end of 2013, more than 471,000 Syrians left their homes and fled to neighbouring countries. The Jordanian government estimated that approximately 120,000 refugees entered the country in 2013. They sought help in refugee camps, but life there is extremely challenging. They are forced to live in makeshift conditions without income, health care, and employment appropriate for their qualifications. The situation is especially difficult for the elderly and families with small children.

Support of education for children of Syrian refugees in Jordan

Refugees have very limited budgets. Even college educated men and women have difficulties to get an adequate source of income. That is why they often take jobs well below their qualifications for a minimum wage. All their income is invested in subsistence and accommodation, which are very expensive in Jordan. Their children have only limited options in continuing their education, which was interrupted by war. School is too great a luxury for many families. They have no money for text-books, notebooks and school bags. ADRA CR launched a public collection in 2012. The money went into a project that provided textbooks and funded the costs of education of children and students. ADRA CR collaborated with ADRA Austria, ADRA Switzerland and ADRA Lebanon.

- ADRA CR participated in the project by donating 100,000 crowns.
- This money provided school materials for 150 children.



Developmental projects

ADRA implements developmental projects with the aim to eliminate long-term problems in developing countries, such as inaccessibility of health care and social services, limited access to education, lack of sources of drinking water and food, poverty etc. Developmental projects support people so that they may take greater control over their lives. Local inhabitants are always involved in individual activities and they are learning to be self-reliant and independent as well as to use their own skills.

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Bangladesh



Bangladesh is one of the poorest countries in the world. More than 40 percent of the population live on less than a dollar a day. Just over a half of adults are literate. The country is dependent on international food aid. A quarter of the inhabitants of the capital city of Dhaka live in slums; a half of them are children. These children have to help in the household, work, and contribute to the family budget from a very young age. Poverty is a vicious circle handed down from generation to generation. Education is one of the most powerful weapons against poverty because it opens new possibilities for young people. Thanks to education, they can get a better job, develop, and help the whole family. ADRA CR has been running BanglaKids, a programme focused on the education of Bangladeshi children, for 15 years. The programme has two projects:

- Direct Sponsorship
- Slum Centre Calantika

Direct Sponsorship

This educational project for children in Bangladesh is a joint project of ADRA CR and BSCC (Bangladesh Children's Sponsorship Services). The project supports children and young adults in their studies at village and boarding schools. The donor financially supports a specific student at a specific school in Bangladesh. Thanks to donors mainly from the Czech and Slovak Republics, ADRA CR has provided education for 6,400 Bangladeshi students since 1999 and opened their path to a better future.

- In 2013, almost 900 donors supported 1, 400 children and young adults at 35 village schools and 7 boarding schools.
- Donors had gifts of their choice bought for 216 students and their families in Bangladesh, such as personal items, clothes, food and domestic animals.

ADRA also provides means for development of individual schools. The boarding school KMMS in the south of Bangladesh provides housing and education for 582 children and young adults from the age of 4 to 16. The school also runs an orphanage for 138 children. The children are very poor and most of them are malnourished. Their diet does not contain many vitamins, minerals and proteins, which they need to grow and also combat infections. The school struggles to provide a balanced diet from local sources by growing their own crops. The amount of vegetables depends on yield and finances; meat is a rarity and so is milk, which most children drink only a couple glasses a year.

The school cannot afford to buy milk for all the children, so the school administrators asked ADRA for help with their own cattle farming. Dairy cows represent a tremendous support for the boarding school: the children can get a steady supply of important nutrients and the school gets a source of manure for the vegetable fields. The project Cows for the school, milk for the children was supported from mid-November 2010 to April 2013.

- Czech donor supported the project by donating 259,250 towards the purchase of cows.
- The boarding school KMMS received 10 cows and 6 calves; 580 children and young adults drink fresh milk regularly.
- Besides the purchase of the animals, the donations also supported a construction of new spacious stables with troughs and feeding.



Through a different project, ADRA CR also supported the boarding school AHTSS, which struggled with a lack of drinking water. More than 600 students and teachers used a local source; however, this source caused health problems. To get good drinking water for the school cafeteria, it was necessary to walk with water cans several kilometres a day. Unfortunately, during the dry season, this source dried up. With the financial support of Maranatha, o.s., ADRA dug out a new well and built a water tank.

Slum Centre Calantika

Regarding the education of Bangladeshi children, the worst situation by far is in shanty towns: slums. Two and a half million children between 6 and 10 years of age still do not have access to elementary education. People in slums live in undignified and unhygienic conditions, below the poverty line without human dignity. Education is a way to fight poverty for these children; it is a chance for a better life than their parents have had.

In summer 2013, ADRA CR opened a centre for education and free time, Calantika, in one of the slums in the capital city of Dhaka. It supports the entire slum community and offers a wide range of services for children and their families.

In 2013, the Centre Calantika provided:

- basic literacy and pre-school education for 50 children between the ages of 5 and 10.
- 216 days at school learning to read and write in Bengali and English, learning maths and learning basic hygiene.
- 5,400 nutritious meals and snacks
- 600 medical check ups and treatments by a doctor
- regular extra-curricular activities, which children in slums lack

Financial support from donors was used for a purchase of school supplies, textbooks, food, medical treatment, for extra-curricular activities for children in the centre, for teachers' salaries, and for rent.



Ethiopia

Health care in Ethiopia belongs among least developed in the countries of sub-Saharan Africa. Based on statistics, 38 percent of Ethiopians live under the poverty line and lack access to medical care. The lack of medications and inadequate equipment in hospitals cause people die from common diseases. Small children are especially at risk. The most frequent causes of death include malnutrition, malaria, and infectious diseases such as tuberculosis and HIV/AIDS. Developmental projects of ADRA CR in Ethiopia focus on health care. All three hospitals supported by ADRA in 2013 are in the Southern Nations, Nationalities and Peoples' Region, one of the poorest regions of Ethiopia.

The accessibility of health care significantly improved lives of the locals because there had not been medical centres in the region that would perform complicated surgical procedures. C-sections represent one of the most frequent complications. The mothers who had not been treated in time often did not survive child-birth. Making health care more accessible reduced the mortality rate of both mothers and newborns, who now receive necessary medical care. ADRA CR runs these projects in cooperation with ADRA Ethiopia. This is beneficial because local workers are perfectly familiar with the situation thanks to their long-term activities in the region.

Support of the hospital in Karat

In 2013, we launched the construction of a hospital in the city of Karat. However, it is necessary to equip the hospital with examination machines, which will be the aim of follow-up projects in the future. Besides equipment, Czechs will provide training to develop professional skills of Ethiopians in obstetrics and mother and baby care.

The catchment area of this hospital amounts to 320,000 inhabitants. The opening of the hospital will greatly improve the standards of care in the entire region.

Development of health care services and training in Leku

A new hospital was also built in the city of Leku in 2012. ADRA CR in cooperation with ADRA Ethiopia provided the hospital and a nearby medical faculty with equipment and technical support. We built accommodation for staff and provided training for local doctors.

- 34, 331 patients were treated in the hospital in Leku in 2013.
- 389 women attended a lecture on family planning.
- 569 childbirths, including 62 C-sections, took place in the hospital.
- 2.113 children were vaccinated.
- 149 employees were trained.
- A new electricity generator was bought for the hospital in 2013.
- A construction of technical base and structural changes were launched.
- The operating theatres received new equipment such as an operating table, a mobile lamp and other tools. The examination rooms were provided with ultrasound and X-ray machines and the laboratory received diagnostic tools.
- ADRA also contributed to equipping and opening of three laboratories at the medical faculty (YAMC).na lékařské fakultě (YAMC).



Support of the hospital in Halaba Kulito

In rural areas of Ethiopia, health care services are limited and people have to travel dozens of kilometres to receive treatment. The citizens of Halaba Kulito launched a financial collection for a construction of their own hospital. They built the hospital from the proceeds, but they did not have money for equipment. ADRA provided basic hospital equipment: beds, surgical tools, delivery beds, incubators, devices for laboratory analyses and equipment for the operating theatre. This meant that gynaecology ward and delivery room could be opened, as well as a dentistry department, ophthalmology, radiology and laboratories. ADRA also build on-site housing for the medical staff, which greatly improved their working conditions. In 2013, ADRA contributed to the surgeon's salary; his position is of a key importance, as he is the only specialist in this hospital.

- In 2013, more than 31,730 patients were treated in the hospital in Halaba Kulito.
- 1,166 childbirths took place, out of which one tenth were C-sections.



Haiti

Haiti belongs among the poorest countries in the northern hemisphere. In 2010, Haiti was hit by a severe earthquake. Tens of thousands people died and 1.5 million inhabitants lost their homes. Surviving farmers consumed all the seeds due to hunger, which increased the threat of famine. ADRA CR started working in Haiti immediately after the catastrophe. We offered necessary humanitarian aid to the people and then we focused on the support of agriculture. The aim of the projects was not only to supply the farmers with seeds, but also to share knowledge with them so that they could farm more effectively.

Support of agriculture in the region of Petit-Goave

The help of ADRA CR was directed at the mountain region of Petit-Goave. Local farmers attended training on farming techniques that improve yields and are environment-friendly. In spring 2012, ADRA focused on the development of business activities of the farmers. At the end of 2012, several small farming cooperatives were established. Their representatives learnt fundamentals of accounting and management. Each cooperative received financial support so that they could set up their own businesses. In 2013, run jointly by ADRA CR, ADRA Canada, the Institute of Tropics and Subtropics of the Czech University of Life Sciences and the Canadian Foodgrain Bank, the project continued to support these business activities.

- Thanks to the project, the yield increased by 35 percent.
- 800 farmers have been trained on the farms since the beginning.
- The established farming cooperatives began to develop a new trade network for their produce.
- One of the products is a local delicacy "chanm-chanm" made from maize, peanuts, coconuts and sugar. It sold out in the first go.



New school for farmers' children

On one of the training farms, there was no school. Almost 200 children learnt in the church. ADRA CR financed a construction of a new school from a special collection. This was received with a tremendous response from the locals, who participated in the construction. The school was finished in 2013; it has three classrooms, a teachers' room and toilets.



Construction of an irrigation system

Good yields presuppose not only correct farming techniques, but also sufficient irrigation. That was a problem in the regions of Petit-Goave. ADRA CR and ADRA Canada provided 848,000 crowns for a construction of a water reservoir.

- 400 farmers gained water for their fields in 2013.
- A committee was established: its mission is to manage the water source, monitor its use and collect small contributions from farmers for its operation and service.



Kenya

On the one hand, Kenya is an attractive tourist destination with a great potential for industrial development; on the other hand, it is still a poor country where a half of the inhabitants suffer from poverty. Rural areas are underdeveloped, which is reflected in insufficient or completely absent health care. This has resulted in a fast-spreading epidemic of HIV/AIDS; approximately 1.3 million people, including 156,000 children, have been infected. There are also other infectious diseases and malaria, which represents a mortal danger especially for infants.

Health care centre in Itibo

ADRA CR has supported a health care centre in the village of Itibo since 2006. As the only health care facility in the Nyamira region, it provides basic care for about 200,000 people. Every day, dozens of local people travel several kilometres to get there. The centre cooperates with the First Faculty of Medicine of Charles University, which sends its students to receive practical training there. ADRA CR is the only organisation in the Czech Republic to arrange such experience for students. The centre is financed from donations and public collections.

- In 2013, 7,420 patients were treated in the centre.
- 114 childbirths took place in the centre.
- 645 children underwent dental check-ups and treatment of teeth.
- In 2013, 10 Czech medical students received practical training in Itibo, out of which two were dentists.



Moldova

There are more than 188,000 pre-school children in Moldova, the poorest European country. More than a third of them do not have the possibility to go to kindergarten. To get a place for a healthy child is difficult, but it is even more so for a child with special needs. Official statistics report 3,500 children who are unable to participate in education due to various disabilities. The situation is still similar to that in the Soviet Union, where the only option for these children was a specialised institution. This, however, leads to social exclusion of children with disabilities.

Support of inclusive education

In cooperation with ADRA Moldova, local authorities and the government, ADRA CR strives to improve the conditions for children with disabilities. Since 2010, we have implemented two projects for more than 20 million crowns: we helped reconstruct and make structural changes in four kindergartens in the Orhei, Edinet, Leova and Stefan Voda districts, and buy special tools. Thanks to that, these kindergartens educated 138 children with special needs, be it physical, mental or combined disabilities. ADRA also pushed through better qualifications for the employees. We provided Czech specialists who trained Moldovans in special education and psychology. Seventy professionals participated in this training. Moreover, each school hired a speech therapist, a psychologist, a special education teacher and a physiotherapist. Each kindergarten is in a different part of the country so together they cover the needs of all regions. The kindergartens also serve as training facilities for other teachers and specialists. ADRA also bought four vans to facilitate commuting to the kindergartens.

- In 2013, ADRA CR reconstructed the kindergarten in the city of Stefan Voda.
- ADRA bought furniture and teaching aids.
- Representatives from the kindergarten in Stefan Voda visited an inclusive kindergarten in Prague in order to gain new practical knowledge.
- 50 pre-school teachers and specialist participated in trai-
- Each kindergarten received a Ford van.



Mongolia

The economy of Mongolia relies heavily on pastoral farming. However, this form of livelihood is very fragile, which was demonstrated during severe frosts in 2010, when around 10 million head of cattle died. Pastoral farmer were threatened by famine. Because frosts come in regular intervals and humanitarian crises recur, it seems that the best solution is finding a more effective form of livelihood. Although Mongolia lacks the tradition of crop farming and land cultivation, people are open to new opportunities as the need for new resources grows.

Support of farming cooperatives

ADRA CR has operated in Mongolia since 2007. That year, the Czech Ministry of Agriculture supported the population in the south in the region of Dornogobi. Mongolian shepherds learnt to farm in a climate that is suitable for crop farming only several months a year. They also established several cooperatives. A year later, ADRA CR extended its activities to the provinces of Selenge and Zavkhan. In 2013, the project focused on the development of the farming cooperatives, the improvement of farmers' business skills, the effectiveness of production, and the facilitation of access to micro-loans for the cooperatives.

- In 2013, the yield in Zavkhan improved by 12 percent, and farmers in Selenge increase the yield of vegetables by 35 tons.
- Cooperatives in Selenge earned 77,000 crowns (when converted) at an agricultural trade fair in Ulaanbaatar.
- 18 cooperative trainers were trained to share their experience with other members of local associations.
- Thanks to their collaboration, the cooperatives have an easier access to business loans.
- ADRA CR provided the farmers with necessary equipment (an autoclave, a milk sanitation machine, a yoghurt maker, a small tractor).

Thailand

The civil war in Myanmar and continuous violation of human rights forced many Myanmarese to leave their homes and look for a sanctuary abroad, most frequently in Thailand.

Today, there are roughly 150,000 refugees in Thailand concentrated in nine camps along the Tai-Myanmarese border. The Thai government does not allow the refugees to do any wage-earning activities and does not support their education. They are completely dependent on the aid of others.

Retraining for Myanmarese refugees

During a project that ran from 2011 to 2013, ADRA CR focused on refugees in Thailand and help them retrain and develop their competencies in accordance with Thai and international educational standards. The aim of the project was to improve economic independence of refugee communities and provide them with professional skills that would enable their return to Myanmar or their integration into Thai society.

- During three years, 7,458 people attended the retraining.
- The retraining was for an IT specialist, a masseur, an agricultural mechanic, a care assistant, an electrical technician, a hairdresser, and a cook.

Ukraine

A crisis fully hit west-oriented Mukachevo, a city in southwestern Ukraine. Almost 30 percent of the inhabitants have serious problems with alcohol. Most children suffer from seemingly invisible problems: torn social ties, hidden aggression and alienation. An unsuitable state policy of child support benefits, which are several times higher than an average salary, makes children hostages of their parents. Children have become a money-making business. Many boys and girls want for parental care, good examples and motivation for decent life. They often become addicted to alcohol at an early age.

Summer camp for children from children's home in Mukachevo In June and July, ADRA CR organised the seventh summer camp for 60 local children between ages 6 and 17, who come from underprivileged or broken homes. ADRA CR strives to create experience suitable for carefree childhood. Students from the Czech Republic participate as volunteers. In 2013, 15 students from universities and professional schools donated their time to the children.



Human rights projects

Human rights projects support the development of civil society in countries undergoing a democratic transformation. They focus on professionalization of local non-governmental organisations, on raising awareness of human rights, and on support of young people so that they may be actively involved in their communities and civic activities. Individual projects also incorporate sharing experience from the Czech Republic.

Myanmar

Myanmar experienced decades under the rule of a military regime, which affected its population and economy. In addition, Myanmar is a country of many ethnic minorities. Social diversity often means a more challenging road to a political agreement and peaceful coexistence of different social groups. Despite a declared democratic transformation, interests of the majority are often enforced with violence and ostracism rather than with a political consensus guaranteed by the constitution of 2008. The rights of ethnic minorities in border regions are constantly being violated, which results in armed conflicts.

Support of civil society in the state of Kayin

After years of armed conflicts, the regions inhabited by ethnic minorities struggle with poverty and discrimination. However, their population should have the right and possibility to participate in decision making that can influence their lives and the structure of their society. Therefore, in 2012 and 2013, ADRA CR ran a project aimed at supporting local non-government organisations, newly established political parties, and young people in the state of Kayin. The people there lack experience with leadership, financial management and strategic planning. ADRA organised courses, workshops, exchange programmes, and visits of other developmental projects.

- In 2012 and 2013, we organised 16 courses on topical social and political issues, human rights and organisational management.
- Students and representatives of non-governmental organi sations and new political parties participated.
- During the project, it was possible to establish a platform through which representatives of local civil initiatives coordinate their activities.
- We organised three one-week-long educational excursions for representatives of Kayin organisations to visit civil initiatives in other parts of Myanmar. Four Kayin also visited the Czech Republic.
- In 2013, 10 student activities and 8 coordination activities took place, including the celebration of International Youth Day, the International Day of Peace and the Civil Society Forum.



Georgia

Domestic violence is still a taboo topic in this country, which lies on the border between Europe and Asia. Even though a survey in 2009 showed that every eleventh married woman is a victim of abuse, the traditional society expects that a woman will not leave her family under any circumstances. In many cases, there is no other option than staying in the marriage because of insufficiently developed social services. Domestic violence is considered a purely family problem that should not be made public. Activities of non-governmental organisations are often perceived as merely an agenda of the western world which defies the cultural tradition of the local family model. Despite this, Georgian legislation is slowly changing, bringing women possibilities to solve their problems. What is lacking though is practical experience that social services providers, lawyers and police can draw on.

Protection of rights of victims of domestic violence

ADRA CR has run a project to strengthen the capacities of the civil sector in the area of women's rights since 2012. ADRA CR branch in Hradec Králové, which operates a centre for victims of domestic violence and the Children's Crisis Centre, is also involved in the project. More than 500 specialists - lawyers, police officers and state officials - and also students and journalists participated in seminars and courses led by Czech instructors.

- ADRA CR together with the organisations GYLA and AVNG organised workshops for specialists and established cooperation with Georgian police.
- Representatives of Georgian non-profit organisations visited the Czech Republic and institutions that specialise in legal protections of victims of domestic violence.
- Curriculum for other instructors was prepared.


ADRA, o. p. s. Financial Report

Sources and the structure of income

Total revenues of ADRA, o. p. s., amounted to 102,247 thousand Czech crowns (CZK) in 2013. The main source of income included public budgets (32 %), donations from individuals and companies (32 %) and income from ADRA's own activities (19 %).

The overview above includes all accessory income and the means that were actually used in 2013. It includes special-purpose income received in previous years and used in 2013, but it does not include special-purpose income received in 2013 that will be used in the following years.



Donations of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church traditionally form one of the stable parts of the financial portfolio of ADRA. In 2013, they amounted to 3 % of total revenues and they helped finance costs that were not considered allowable under the conditions of implemented projects, or costs that were not covered by budgets of such projects.

A Coin a Day - a programme of regular donorship

In 2013, more than 400 new regular donors joined ADRA's donorship programme A Coin a Day. The donorship programme embraces the idea that even a small regular financial contribution can provide meaningful support to those in need

Financial means acquired through the programme A Coin a Day are divided into three parts:

- 1/3 supports volunteering and global development education
- in the Czech Republic
- 1/3 goes to long-term developmental projects and immediate emergency relief abroad
- 1/3 is allocated for operation, fundraising and development of the ADRA organisation

In the Czech Republic in 2013, thanks to the donors from A Coin a Day programme, ADRA was able to cover costs of recruitment and training of volunteers in the volunteer centres or co-finance programmes for children and adults that visit the counselling centre for victims of violence in Hradec Králové.

Abroad, contributions from A Coin a Day supported, among others, 850 families in Myanmar, who were hit by floods. In Haiti, an irrigation system was built in small farms. In Mongolia, small agricultural cooperatives were trained in business, and 12 community health centres in the Kayin state in Myanmar were provided with basic medical equipment and medicine.

Costs and economic result

In 2013, ADRA, o. p. s., implemented external projects (i.e. excluding projects that supported its own development) in a total value of 81, 404 thousand CZK. Humanitarian projects in the Czech Republic received 21,393 thousand CZK (most means were donated towards the costs of help to those affected by floods in June). The total volume of provided support rose by 28,599 thousand CZK in comparison with 2012. n 2013, ADRA,

o. p. s., spent a total of 17, 585 thousand CZK on personnel costs, which expressed in full-time positions amounts to 38.

In 2013, ADRA, o. p. s., showed an after-tax profit of 4,589 thousand CZK. The positive economic result was accomplished especially due to proceeds from immovables sold, but also due to an increased proportion of income from accessory activities (the sales of charity shops in 2013 doubled in comparison with the sales in 2012).
